The Widow & the Judge

Pastor Mark Wilks, LUKE 18:1-8

Introduction:

- Jesus gives us the theme up front: persistent prayer
- This is a parable of <u>contrast</u> rather than of correspondence.
- The "always pray" idea means to pray consistently and persistently without losing heart.

1. The <u>heartless</u> judge.

- The judge acts solely in <u>self-interest</u>.
- He doesn't care about what men think about him he has no <u>shame</u>.
- Literally, she "is <u>beating</u> me black and blue and will be the <u>end of me</u>." Again he is acting in <u>self-interest</u>.

2. The <u>abandoned</u> widow.

- The widow is a symbol of the <u>poor</u> and <u>defenseless</u>.
- She realized she couldn't solve her own problems.
- Prayer is a matter of the <u>trusting</u> heart.

3. Our <u>relationship</u> with the one true judge.

- Learned desperation is at the heart of a praying life. Ps 42:1, Is. 26:9, Jn. 7:37
- Prayer is an <u>action</u> of the heart.

"Prayer isn't very important to many Christians because Jesus is just <u>an add-on</u>." Paul Miller, A Praying Life
